But after some committed time in two centers in Virginia, he was released and has kept active in recovery groups in Knoxville, Tennessee, since this past June. Getting a job as a machine operator/tech for making fiberglass drew him to Knoxville.







We were called upon to fly him back home to Virginia, where he would live with his dad; he had been released from his recovery program and was <u>cleared for departure</u>. Just a little aviation humor there. *Ahem* Humor aside, Jesse's job would transfer to Virginia, and he will keep doing what he enjoys. It's no longer a bottle of alcohol attached to his hand, but the joy of living with self-respect that yielded a sense of fulfillment in life. Because of his ordeal, he became familiar with God in a beautiful way.

While sometimes God brings us to a situation that requires us to rely on Him for success, there are situations that we bring upon ourselves where God, ever working in the background to draw us to Him, uses our destructive circumstances to help us see the need of Him and for deliverance from our addictions. Our addictions are anything that rules supreme in our lives. That said, there is only one addiction that we can safely have that yields a bounty of blessings, and that is being addicted to Jesus.

In Matthew 12:43-45 Jesus tells the story of an unclean spirit who has gone out of a man, going about and seeking a place of rest but finds none. The demon declares that he will return to the house it left. However, when it returns, it finds the house swept and put back in order. It then takes with it seven other spirits more wicked than itself, and then the man's condition is worse in the end than when he started. *Why?* The man did not fill the void in his house with Jesus. When we remove the bad, the vice, the addiction, we can't just take it and not replace it with something, or we will return to what we started and only increase the vice from there on out.

Jesse filled the void of alcohol with a great job, loving support, and a growing love for Jesus. It's his relationship with God that's the most powerful tool against his former addiction. He was so grateful and so thankful for our services to him and our attentiveness to his needs.
