To acknowledge Adventist Laypersons' Services and Industries' (ASI) partnership with AWA, a second dedication was conducted on May 5, 2001 during the Lake Union ASI Chapter's Annual Conference in Holland, Michigan. ASI leaders, Debbie Young, Robert Slikkers and Elder Dwight Hilderbrandt officiated in the dedication service.

The aircraft dedication holds behind it a story of providence.

It was January 2000. Clifton Brooks, AWA Philippines project pilot was on a mission survey of unreached villages on the island of Palawan including the village of Tag Biao Biao. The villagers, having never seen a white man, were quite intrigued with him. Clifton recorded the experience on his video camera.

The next day Bobby, a Philippine Frontier

missionary, revealed to Clif that cameras weren't allowed into the village. Horrified that he had unwittingly transgressed a village rule, Clif remarked that everyone had such a good time seeing themselves on camera.

Bobby continued, "Four nights ago in a dream, Ainito, the village 'protector' saw you, the supervisor, and your guide coming up the trail into the village. He saw you with your camera. He knew you were a pilot. He knew why you were coming: to bring help to the village."

Clifton sat stunned. "They had known we were coming!" he thought. "Four days before, I was far to the north. There was absolutely no way anyone could have heard of our coming. But they knew. God had shown them in a dream!"

Clif later said, "God Himself prepared the way to take the Gospel story and the camera that the villagers otherwise would have never allowed. God was already at work before we got there. These people didn't want the outside world, and didn't want outsiders in their forest. They have chosen to remain isolated and secluded, and didn't want any religion but animism. But God was at work preparing them long before we arrived."

As a symbol of friendship, the Chief of Tag Biao Biao and the missionary pilot planted a pineapple top to grow in the midst of the village. The chief indicated his desire for Clif to return and eat the fruit with them when it would mature in about a year and a half.

"They understood about the airplane. They (Continued on page 2)

Preparing (or Being Prepared) for Guyana!

We knew that we wanted to be involved in mission aviation even before we were married (August '99)! Then in November 2000, my wife Laura and I accepted a call to join Marcio and Jane Costa as part of the Adventist World Aviation-Project Airpower missionary team to Guyana! Here's how it all happened.

In the early fall of 1998, we drove to Berrien Springs as Laura had an appointment with the nursing department at Andrews University. She was considering pursuing her Masters degree in nursing at that time. When we arrived, Laura went to her appointment only to find out that the person she was supposed to meet with forgot about the meeting and was actually on vacation! That seemed rather strange since Laura had confirmed with her just that week.

Laura had also heard about the aviation program at Andrews. On our way out that morning, we stopped at the airpark to find out more about what they had to offer. Our thought was that Laura would run in quickly and grab some information and we would be on our way. Well, approximately one hour later (I had begun a short nap on the lawn by this time), she emerged from the building excited about what she had heard about how God was working through AWA. After several lengthy discussions and many prayers, we decided to become involved with AWA! Laura grew up overseas as a daughter of a missionary pilot so she was very comfortable with the idea. As the Lord would have it, I had wanted to become involved in missions since I took part in a Maranatha project to Mexico a few years back. However, I also wanted to get married someday!
