



The village of Birch Creek is approximately 90 nautical miles north of Fairbanks and about 20 miles south of the Yukon River. It is a small village of just less than thirty inhabitants. For over 100 years it has been considered an Episcopal strong-hold. Until about ten years ago when, due to budget short-falls and limited staffing, the Episcopal Church withdrew. The fairly new log chapel then sat silent.

The pastor's log cabin also was quiet and empty. No visiting priest, no itinerating clergy came here to lead singing, prayers, and no preacher stood behind the rustic pulpit.

It was about 6 years ago a Seventh-day Adventist layperson from Fairbanks became aware of the situation and befriended several village residents.

When asked about the possibility of holding services in the vacant chapel, the village chief made it known that only those who teach the holiness of the seventhday, Saturday, would be welcome.


The chief had come to this conclusion based on his own Bible study!
