# **Heading to Guyana?**

We are heading to Guyana... Prayerfully in December! Praise God from Whom all blessings flow. We have several hurdles to circumvent, but we are grateful for this opportunity to assess the project and spend the holidays with our Guyanese friends and family.

Pandemic restrictions persist, so before we travel and enter Guyana, we must have a clear molecular biological PCR test within 7 days of arrival. Persons whose tests were taken more than 72 hours (3 days) prior to travel are required to have a repeat test done on arrival in Guyana. Persons whose test was taken within 72 hours (less than 3 days) prior to travel are not currently required to retest upon arrival.



Rapid tests, antibody or antigen test are unacceptable for travel to Guyana. Therefore, test results require validation by Officials from the Ministry of Health in Guyana. Passengers with a negative PCR result taken within 72 hours of travel will be assessed by Port Health and if asymptomatic will be free to proceed to the immigration points. After which, we will be permitted to leave the airport with clearance by Immigration, Customs and Port Health Officials. If we arrive with molecular PCR tests exceeding the 72-hour threshold, we are required to repeat the PCR test at the facilities provided at the airport. Persons arriving in Guyana without a valid, negative COVID-19 PCR test result may be denied entry into the country or required to take a test upon arrival, at their own expense. Whew! Please help us pray that our travel will be smooth and incident free.

## Throwback in Time

When we were in Guyana, we experienced many miracles. The first and most unforgettable one was that of the bottomless sack of rice, flour and sugar during Christmastime. We didn't understand this blessing until a minute after the sacks were all given away. Only then did they realize the miracle that God had used them as a vessel for His people. If we kept the sacks, many more may have benefited from the rice, flour and sugar.



This Christmas let us reflect on our current blessings because all of us have them; we may realize it now or we may not. Merry Christmas and a blessed New Year!
