


Let's Talk about Amphibious Float Planes

An amphibious aircraft or amphibian is an aircraft that can take off on both land and water. This type of aircraft is equipped with retractable wheels. After takeoff from a hard surface the pilot retracts the wheels to get a bit more speed. An occasional problem with amphibians is with ensuring the wheels are in the correct position for landing. In normal operation, the pilot uses a checklist, verifying each time he takes off: wheels up for water landing, wheels down for runways. If he should land on a runway with wheels up it would harm the floats significantly but if he should land on water with wheels down the aircraft would flip and it would be a total loss of the aircraft and possible life. There is no room for error. Amphibious aircraft are particularly useful as "bush planes" engaging in light transport in remote areas where they are required to operate not only from airstrips, but also from lakes and rivers.

During Thanksgiving week we were finally able to deliver the long awaited Cessna 185 amphibious float plane to Ontario, Canada. Many hands have been placed upon C-FWOH; many prayers and words spoken in dedication and blessings expressed for the important outreach that the plane will be used for in supporting the region approximately 200 miles (or 300 kilometers) around Sioux Lookout.





There is a value to having a float plane to reach the northern indigenous communities separated by lakes, limited roads in and out of each community and the vast remote landscape in the region of Sioux Lookout. There are 30 plus communities and many camps that this private aircraft can lend support to that commercial services just can't meet at an affordable cost. Using friendship evangelism as our approach we will show the love of God to all; no matter what color, race, or belief system they may be. God loves us all and freely we have received, so freely we must give. If we want more from our Lord, we must first give what He has already blessed us with.
