The front end of the truck needed repairs while we were in Nicaragua, so we made the slow drive over bumpy gravel roads and potholes to Puerto Cabezas - which is 3 hours from the AWA mission base.

Along the way there were two military checkpoints. We always gave a smile and shared the "thumbs up sign" to the guards who then dropped the rope across the road letting us through.


There are also 3-4 stops along the way where a few adults and kids have pulled a rope across the road; they personally repair the roads and want a toll for their efforts. The cost of letting the rope down and to pass is a few cordobas for the

adults and for the kids we gave them cookies. Watching the children's faces light up when they get a pack of cookies each and a thumbs up for their hard work made us smile and laugh. We could just say "Tu wala" in Miskito, which means next time (we will give you payment), but we're here to make a positive connection with them and this is a small gesture.

When we arrived in town we met with Cezar, our local contact. He directed us to a mechanic who helped with low cost repairs for missionaries. When we picked up the truck a day later and paid the shockingly low sum of \$35.00 US for two days of work, I gave them a thumbs up and spoke to them in Miskito saying, "tanki pali " which means thank you. Behind me I heard a few chuckles so I turned around and asked what was so funny. The one mechanic answered, "we have never heard someone that looks like you, try to speak our language."

We all laughed about my basic communication skills, but they were impressed that I was trying.
