While at times I can respond to major disasters, I can't be in all places at once. So, while I wait to deploy to my next mission, I sometimes feel like I'm on the sidelines waiting to jump in and do something. It's frustrating! Then God opened my eyes.

Driving home from the hangar (headquarters) I noticed a lady walking on the side of the highway. It was already dark, and the nearest exit was seven miles away. Pulling over I asked if she was okay. The Lady (Shelby) told me her car had

died and she was trying to reach a gas station where a friend she knew could help her. She had already been walking for over an hour in the dark.

While I drove her to the gas station, I was able to share with her my testimony and all about Wings 4 Humanity (AWA's sister humanitarian organization). She was touched by my story and very grateful for my help.

Afterwards, I stopped to help two more individuals on the side of the road. One needed help putting on a tire, and the other had run out of gas.

I learned that I don't have to be in the Ukraine or a disaster zone to make a difference in someone's life. I don't have to travel a thousand miles to help people, I can change lives from home. I can do it right in my own "backyard." If I want to help someone all I must do is go for a drive.

I will be equipping my car with an emergency kit, roadside assistance tools, and literature. Every day I see someone in need, and while I'm ready to deploy to fill needs thousands of miles away, I will also be ready to fill the needs around me.





No matter the weather, I am called to serve. If I'm not faithful in the little things how can God trust me to respond to the big things? I am a Disaster Relief Specialist for Wings 4 Humanity, that means responding to both big and small disasters.

Yes, there are many who would take advantage of kindness, both for their own gain or to do harm, but my job is to respond. Simply stepping outside is an act of faith nowadays, danger lurks everywhere. However, perfect love casts out fear, and every time I stop to help a stranger, I am putting my life on the line, but that is the job.

I was moving through life and completely ignoring the needs of those around me, and it's not like I don't see them, the person on the side of the road struggling with a tire. I did see them; I just CHOSE not to acknowledge their need. I was always "running late for..." or "I saw them too late" or "what could I do to help?" so I would just keep driving. I can be there for them, struggle with them, just like Jesus did for us.
