



A LITTLE CHILD SHALL LEAD THEM



As a natural born leader and a little missionary at heart, her ability to connect with people was in full glory. Whether it was passersby or the vendors, she immediately began networking with everyone inside the hangar where AWA's booth was located. Very quickly the other vendors learned who she was with. They fell in love with her. She'd run around gifting them with handmade items she accrued from different booths in the hangars.

When the other vendors would walk by, they'd say, "Hi," and comment on Hadahsa's sweetness or friendliness. When she'd go out walking with her father for a business walk (the goal talking to other vendors about working with our organization and our needs to acquire discounts or donations), she was not only an icebreaker but an aid in beginning conversations due to her precociousness.

There was a special warmth that was felt in the hangar this year among the vendors that I can't recall I've ever truly felt. A little child had led them, perhaps to be better, perhaps to inspiration, but certainly to a new glimpse of what Jesus' love and His heart looks like in action...even if they didn't realize it.

Proverbs 22:6 says that when we train up a child in the way they should go, when they are older, they will not depart from it. I can't think of a better way to build a child's foundation than cultivating a love of sharing Jesus' love to all they meet.
