These vicious creatures, if not eradicated, can cause major damage to wood structures. Praise the Lord for Alfi and Sonita who tirelessly work to rid our dwellings of these pests. With the abundance of water during the May rainy season there is undoubtedly the constant problem of mold which Alfi also helps to resolve. We are praying that the Hamombe Family (Pumelela, Tali and Daniel) will deploy to Guyana soon. The harvest awaits them, God's people await them and so does the mission of bringing Hope to the people they encounter.
