He explains it like this:

Initially, when starting on an avionics update project with the 172 trainer we use for mission pilots, I had a plan to do some very simple upgrades. That included updating the plane for a more modern platform which has a similar layout to what we have in the field in our 182's. The more I dug into the plane the more I kept finding things–excess *baggage*–that were part of previous installations that had never been removed.

The simple fact is that in the past, the plane had gone through several updates, and rather than removing the equipment and wires no longer being used, it was left in the plane (out of sight out of mind). So, in an effort to simplify while upgrading things, I kept digging out and removing all the extra forgotten, no longer used tidbits, and by time I was done, I had quite the pile of excess. I weighed everything I removed and it all added up to 40lbs. That's a lot of weight in an airplane! Not to mention one of the pieces of equipment that was removed was able to be sold to help cover the cost of its replacement.

Sometimes we have things in our lives that we've put "out of sight, out of mind." Dealing with those items can be a lot of work and sometimes hard for us to drudge through. We're quite literally taking out the trash.
