When summer comes, the busy bees follow, and like a yearly migration, the busy bees of AWA trek up north to Wisconsin. We participate in the EAA AirVenture at Oshkosh as exhibitors in Hangar D and in the IAMA tent, where all the other missionary aviation organizations gather. IAMA stands for International Association of Missionary Aviation. It's a great time of fellowship, connection, and time to lift each other up in mission and logistics. But apart from the cordial mission interactions in the tent, there are likewise meaningful interactions with our booth in Hangar D—some missions, yes, but often the base and reporting center for all other business interactions.

We've shared about how Hadahsa has impacted the vendors in the past. She also has had an impact on those who are airshow participants. There's an Aerobatic team that was sponsored by Shell, and Hadahsa loves to meet up with them at Sun N' Fun each year. They're always at EAA

but are usually far out on the grounds, in a place we rarely visit. It's a LOT of walking! It's easy to rack up over 16,000 steps a day! However, this year, the sponsored Shell team

At EAA, the Titan Aerobatic team made their rounds to different

booths, signing autographed posters and taking photos with people. Hadahsa had found them and acquired the obligatory poster she always finds at these events, signed and banded. She came and found me, wanting me to take a photo with them. We were greeted with hugs, and a picture was taken. Then afterward, I spoke with one of the pilots about whether or not it was possible to talk to someone in the Titan company about a potential partnership with our organization. They have fuel worldwide; could they help fuel us somehow within our humanitarian work? I got the contact information of someone to speak with, and we will see how that goes.

In the meantime, as missionaries know, people are always watching. We're still unsure how it came about, but Hadahsa seems known for her connection with the Aerobatic team. As we walked into the park the following day, Hadahsa had gotten a few paces ahead. Cars, ATVs, and golf carts were periodically coming up the little winding road exhibitors take to walk into the event grounds. A nice, black minivan came up the road from behind us, passed us and Hadahsa, but stopped. Back-up lights engaged, and the vehicle slowly backed up and rolled down its window to Hadahsa with an exuberant hello. Though it looked questionable, we were right there, only a few paces behind. It was a van full of representatives from Titan. They knew about Hadahsa.

"Hey! We've got a free T-shirt for you, young lady!" they announced ecstatically.

They asked where we were located, seeing that we were vendors, too. So we told them about our two locations: the IAMA tent and Hangar D, and that Hadahsa would be in the

Hangar with Daddy that morning.

"Perfect! We'll come by and get you that T-shirt!" they promised.

Later that morning, a runner for the Titan team came by the booth and invited Hadahsa and Kyle to come along. The Aerobatic team was in another hangar signing posters again. There was a line when Kyle and Hadahsa arrived,



but that didn't matter. Other reps communicated that Hadahsa Stevenson had arrived, and the rep brought her up front.

"I have a shirt for you!" he beamed.

She got a bright pink shirt, a dark Titan blue shirt, and four hats!

While so many little lessons can be drawn from this one experience, one thing can be said for sure: taking time to invest in relationships is paramount when making an impact on the kingdom of God.
