



## Uganda Mission Project Update



## SEATTLE SABBATH SCHOOL TRANSITION

The semester began with new students from within and outside Uganda. Several factors contribute to this because almost all neighboring countries have internal political conflicts and internal armed groups staging rebel struggles against their governments and among themselves. Therefore, there is a safe haven for youths at Bugema University International Sabbath School named Seattle.

AWA agreed with Bugema University to host AWA on Bugema land, construct an aerodrome as a base for aviation services, and support the Seattle Sabbath School to become a center of influence. This center of influence will meet some of the needs of the youth, help them forge their future, and give service to humanity in the fear of the Lord. This partnership has highlighted Bugema University, thus attracting many international students.

However, we have two challenges. One is having funds to construct the center of influence, which will host AWA offices and provide a hall space for students to worship from and move from the hostel courtyard. Two is raising funds to construct the aerodrome for a runway. We therefore appeal to well-wishers to choose which part of the project to fund so that the AWA Uganda project may be implemented for humanitarian services as planned.


I was pleased to receive a service call from my former field, inviting me to be the main speaker at the Kasambira campmeeting. This place is in northeast Uganda, 57 km from where AWA plans to construct a runway to facilitate humanitarian aid and services to the neighboring districts. It allowed me to sensitize church members and the community about the coming missionary activities in this region.

The campmeeting lasted seven days. We received youths interested in volunteering in evangelistic plans with AWA, such as singing, offering medical talks, and educational sensitization during public gospel outreaches daily. Many youths are trained for evangelism activities at the SDA School, which hosted the campmeeting.

As this place is evolving from a trading center into a town council, negative impacts are affecting family life, and this was echoed during prayer requests from both men and women. I am following up with individuals who still call for counselling and prayers. We plead for support for AWA so that when this project takes place in this area, various types of humanitarian services will be promoted by church members who know what AWA is for and are ready to volunteer.
